# LIFE MEMBER NUMBER ONE



# LESLIE J. STOTTLE MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP


The scholarship committee has selected three students to receive \$500 scholarships for the 2004-05 academic year.




President Greg Smith (Left) and Past President Tom Petty (Right)

#### FROM THE COMMANDER

#### To all members of Hill 4-11:

Ida Mae and I had a fantastic time at the Hill 411 reunion in Atlanta. Debbie and Gene Brown put on an outstanding reunion. They did this in a quiet and efficient manner that is seldom seem: however, has become the norm for sponsors of Hill 4-11 reunions. Thank you Debbie and Gene!!

The more I see our members in action it reinforces my belief that I served with the best of the best the Army had to offer. Colonel Jack Tredwell, the Commanding Officer of the 11th Inf. Bde., ranked the 3rd Bn. 1st. Inf. as number one in the Brigade. General Lloyd Ramsey, Commanding General of the Americal Division ranked the 3rd BN. 1st INf. as number one in the Division. He stated as far as he was concerned the best battalion in the army!! This ranking was only possible because of the men in the battalion and those that supported us. You gave 110% and as we all know too many gave all....their lives. This country of ours is the best in the world because you served your country during it's greatest turmoil and still serving it in communities throughout the country. I am so proud of you, all of you, whether we served the 3rd Bn. 1st. Inf at the same time or not.

I would now like to comment on the efforts physically and/or emotionally individuals overcame to be with us in Atlanta. First, Brenda Walker the wife of John Walker, Hill 411 vice-president since 2002. John died suddenly at home on January 25, 2004 with Brenda at his side. Due to scheduling difficulties at Arlington National Cemetery John could not be buried until March 18, 2004. John was buried with full military honors, and the best I have ever attended. Brenda, told me then that they intended to attend Hill 411 reunion in Atlanta in July, that John had made reservations for before he died. So in less that six months from the day John died, Brenda was in Atlanta representing herself and John. Way to go Brenda.

Next is the physical effort of Owen Harding. His efforts remind me of individuals who are wounded in combat refusing medical aid until they defeated the enemy and the mission completed. Owen suffering from kidney failure, would not let this physical problem keep him and his family from traveling from Oklahoma to Atlanta for the reunion. Owen you truly exhibited giving the 110% effort I mentioned earlier. Owen you have given all of us an example to emulate!!

Last but not least, I want to thank those of Hill 411 Assn. who made it possible for me to be issued the first life time member of The Hill 411 Assn. I am honored and humbled by the special recognition. I know that I don't deserve it for there are too many of you that have worked so hard to form Hill 411 Assn. and to make it stronger reunion by reunion. It is the greatest honor for me and I thank you.

I will now close by enclosing a copy of a letter and poem Terry Weeks sent me in 2000. I think it points our how much family and loved ones have supported and found out so much more about these dedicated veterans of the Vietnam conflict and proud members of Hill 411 Assn.
